

The Gathering

At the sound of the bell, all stand for the opening hymn.

Celebrant Please stand if you are able.

Collect for Purity

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

Collect of the Day

Celebrant E noho pū ka Haku me 'oukou.
The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Celebrant E pule kākou. Let us pray.

The Celebrant says the following Collect of the Day.

Stir up your power, O Lord, and with great might come among us; and, because we are sorely hindered by our sins, let your bountiful grace and mercy speedily help and deliver us; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be honor and glory, now and for ever. Amen.

Celebrant Please sit for the reading.

The Lessons

The people sit. The lector will do the readings.

The New Testament

*A reading from **Philippians 4:4-7***

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Lector The Word of the Lord.

People Thanks be to God.

A Psalm, will follow the Reading.

Lector Let us read the Psalm responsively. The congregation will respond after each asterisk.

The Response - The First Song of Isaiah

Surely, it is God who saves me; *
I will trust in him and not be afraid.

For the Lord is my stronghold and my sure defense, *
and he will be my Savior.

Therefore you shall draw water with rejoicing *
from the springs of salvation.

And on that day you shall say, *
Give thanks to the Lord and call upon his Name;

Make his deeds known among the peoples; *
see that they remember that his Name is exalted.

Sing the praises of the Lord, for he has done great things, *
and this is known in all the world.

Cry aloud, inhabitants of Zion, ring out your joy, *
for the great one in the midst of you is the Holy One of Israel.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: *
as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever.
Amen.

Celebrant If you are able, please stand for the Gospel.

All stand as able.

Holy Gospel

The Celebrant reads the Gospel, first saying

Celebrant **Ka ‘Euanelio Hemolele o ko kākou Haku ‘o Iesu Kristo.**

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Luke 3:7-18

John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."

And the crowds asked him, "What then should we do?" In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you."

Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people.

Nicene Creed

We believe in one God,
the Father, the Almighty,
maker of heaven and earth,
of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God, Light from Light,
true God from true God,
begotten, not made,
of one being with the Father.
Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation
he came down from heaven:
by the power of the Holy Spirit
he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary,
and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;
he suffered death and was buried.
On the third day he rose again
in accordance with the Scriptures;
he ascended into heaven
and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Confession of Sin

The Celebrant says

If you are able, please kneel.

E hō'ike aku kākou mau hala kū'ē i ke Akua a me ko kākou hoalauna.

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Silence.

Celebrant and People

Most merciful God,
we confess that we have sinned against you
in thought, word, and deed,
by what we have done,
and by what we have left undone.
We have not loved you with our whole heart;
we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.
We are truly sorry and we humbly repent.
For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ,
have mercy on us and forgive us;
that we may delight in your will,
and walk in your ways,
to the glory of your Name. Amen.

acknowledgement of peace (bow, wave, etc.)*

Please sit for the announcements.

Celebrant Walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself for us, an offering and sacrifice to God. *Ephesians 5:2*

(The plate offering stays at the back of the church and will not be brought forward. Please place your offerings before or after the service. Music is played until the Celebrant is ready to continue with the Great Thanksgiving.)

Great Thanksgiving

Prayer A

Celebrant Please stand if you are able.

Celebrant **E noho ka Haku me ‘oukou.**
The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Celebrant **E hāpai a’e i ko ‘oukou mau na’au.**
Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them to the Lord.

Celebrant **E ho’omaika’i aku kākou i ko kākou Haku Akua.**
Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People It is right to give him thanks and praise.

The Celebrant proceeds

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

For in the multitude of your saints you have surrounded us with a great cloud of witnesses, that we might rejoice in their fellowship, and run with endurance the race that is set before us; and, together with them, receive the crown of glory that never fades away.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord, God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.

Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

The Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

(At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.)

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, “Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.” ‘O ko’u Kino kēia, i ha’awi ‘ia aku no ‘oukou. E hana ‘oukou penei i kēia me ka ho’omana’o mai ia’u.

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, “Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me.” E inu ‘oukou i kēia, no ka mea, ‘o ko’u Koko kēia o ke kauoha Hou, i ho’okahe ‘ia no ‘oukou me ka lehulehu, no ke kala ‘ia ana o nā hewa, ke ‘oukou inu, e hana penei, me ka ho’omana’o mai ia’u.

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him.

Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN.*

The Celebrant then continues

Breaking of the Bread

A period of silence is kept.

Celebrant Alleluia. *Ua mōhai 'ia 'o Iesu Kristo ko kākou mōliaola no kākou.* Christ our
Passover is sacrificed for us;

People Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia.

The Celebrant continues

Na Makana a ke Akua no ka Po'e a ke Akua. The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

(The pianist will go up to the altar first for the communion of bread. The Celebrant will then bring the communion of bread only to the front by the pews for the congregation.)

After Communion, the Celebrant says

Celebrant Please stand if you are able.
E pule kākou. Let us pray.

Celebrant and People

Eternal God, heavenly Father,
you have graciously accepted us as living members
of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ,
and you have fed us with spiritual food
in the Sacrament of his Body and Blood.

Send us now into the world in peace,
and grant us strength and courage
to love and serve you
with gladness and singleness of heart;
through Christ our Lord. Amen.

COMMEMORATING THE BIRTHDAY OF
KING KAMEHAMEHA V



Born December 11, 1830, the son of Chief Mataiao Kekūanao‘a, governor of Oahu (1839-1868) and High Chiefess Kīna‘u, daughter of Kamehameha I, Kuhina-nui and governor of Oahu 1832-1839, Lot Kamehameha acceded to the throne on 30 November 1863 upon the death of his brother Kamehameha IV.

The reign of Kamehameha V saw great changes in the growth of Honolulu, with a number of major building projects initiated by the King himself, including the building of the Hawaiian Hotel (subsequently the first Royal Hawaiian Hotel), the Aliiolani Hale (the original design for Iolani Palace and now the state judiciary building), Iolani Barracks, the Royal Mausoleum, and numerous schools and other government structures. In 1867, Kamehameha V officiated at the laying of the cornerstone of St. Andrew's Cathedral, initiating a building program which would take 90 years to complete.

RIP...The Reverend George Lee, 1927-2021:

The Reverend George Lee (age 94) died on Friday, December 3rd. George was ordained a Priest in the Diocese of Western Massachusetts in 1958. He arrived in Hawai'i in 1966 to oversee the Urban Ministry Program (a ministry initiated throughout the Episcopal Church by the Executive Council). Through the years, he was the Vicar of St. Luke's Church, Honolulu; Vicar of St. Philip's (now named St. John the Baptist) Church, Mā'ili; and Campus Minister at the Canterbury House (UH Manoa). In retirement, he was an active "member" (always in the pew and not at the altar) of St. Mark's, Kapahulu.

Please keep Grace and the Lee family in your prayers.

O God, who hast made thy servant George to flourish among the Ministers of Apostolic Succession in the honorable office of a Priest: grant, we beseech thee, that he may also be joined with them in perpetual fellowship. Through thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.


